

As part of the ongoing FLEP's Transformed Livelihood Project (TLP) 2025 implementation, communities in more different locations have been reached and we're glad to share this experience with you from these communities we have engaged in recent times.

TLP TRAINING IN **ASAGA OHAFIA**

30 participants in Asaga Ohafia Local Government of Abia State were engaged in a three day Entrepreneurship, Life skills and practical Agricultural (Goat and Tomatoes) training. This training was designed to inspire participants towards entrepreneurship and employment opportunities. participants were empowered with tomato seeds, ensuring they could immediately put their learning into practice.

Feedback from the participants showed that they gained improved knowledge on modern farming methods, learned the value of accountability and discipleship for good moral living, and developed internal motivation to grow businesses with little resources.



Looking ahead, the newly emerging cooperative in Asaga will serve as a platform for growth, support, and further engagement. FLEP also plans to commence discipleship programs to nurture values alongside business skills. As part of the next empowerment phase, participants will receive goats to deepen their practical involvement in livestock farming. The TLP 2025 training in Asaga is not only creating economic opportunities but also building a community grounded in growth, faith, and long-term sustainability.











40 Youths Undergo Hands-On Business Training in Gwagwalada July - Sept. 2025



As the Transformed Livelihood Project (TLP 2025) continues to reach more communities. semi-urban Gwagwalada, a area, has also come on board. Forty young people, including those already running small businesses and others interested in starting one, recently took part in a hands-on three-day entrepreneurship training. The sessions covered entrepreneurship concepts on Lean startup, value proposition and financial management.

Our objective during the training is improve to participant's entrepreneurial knowledge and capacity to run profitable businesses.

As part of the next phase, the participants will now begin "The Big Assignment" where they will run a sample business for a few months.



This practical step will prepare them for the second module of the training, help real-world business experience and qualify them for the next phase of support and empowerment.

IDOWS IN SHEDA **COMMUNITY TRAINED IN** IMPROVED AGRICULTURAL PRACTICE

Sheda community through Transformed Livelihood project, FLEP trained 26 vulnerable widows on life skills, self-awareness, starting a cooperative, livestock (Goat & Bee), and crop (Tomato) farming.

These women from Sheda, having lost their husbands who used to be the breadwinners of their families now find it difficult to feed themselves, as their only source of income is peasant farming and trading of crops and foodstuffs like vegetables and 'garri'. Among participants are women whose husbands are alive but struggling to feed their families.

The women shared how beneficial the training will be not just for them but also for their children and the larger Sheda community. As Mrs. Helen Kanu said, "My husband died since 1996 and left three children with me. Life has been tough and I have been doing petty business and selling food just like "Mama put" to feed.



Now, I have learnt how to take care of my goat myself and farm by tomatoes better. This will be of help to me. I will also teach mv children these things I have learnt." Like other communities. these women have all received Tomato seeds and will later be empowered with goats and beehives. FLEP'S BUSINESS AND MISSIONS TRAINING IN AKURE





Nineteen members of the Navigators' community in Akure, Ondo State, gathered for two days FLEP training on entrepreneurship and missions. They were taught on lean startup, customer development, motivation, personal financial management, and income statements. The aim was to encourage young people to build profitable businesses while also taking part in missions.

Ayo, a 400-level student of FUTA, shared his excitement, saying, "I never would've thought business and missions can complement each other." Others too also gained valuable lessons. Mrs. Motunde got new ideas for her online channel, Dunde Hacinto received helpful knowledge to improve his primary school in Angola, and Victor Akpagu found fresh direction for his media company.

The FLEP team plans to keep working with these participants in Akure raising young people who can carry the Bible in one hand and their business in the other. There is still so much to be done.

Thrive Ahead Project Unlocking Possibilities

In May, FLEP Nigeria started the Thrive Ahead Project (TAP) by training six young ladies in digital and administrative skills. These ladies came from vulnerable places such as IDP camps and slum communities in Abuja, where opportunities are often hard to find.

For one month, they received both practical training and life skills mentoring. This helped them gain knowledge, confidence, and the right mindset to face real-life challenges and give back to their communities with purpose. After the training, they moved into internships where they are now putting their new skills into practice.

In July, a second group of four young ladies joined the project. They have completed their training and also internship different have started organizations to keep learning and growing.

Some of the participants shared how much the project has changed them. Mercy Adeleke said, "I never knew I could learn things like graphic design and how to use a computer properly.



Now I can even help my classmates." While Stella Chidemezu said, "I feel more confident now." TAP is more than just training, it is about helping young people discover their value, develop their voice, and break free from the cycle of poverty.
